Dear Parents and Caregivers,

Although many restrictions are easing around COVID-19 guidelines, some still remain unchanged.

These include students and staff that have flu like symptoms must have a negative COVID test result and be symptom free before returning to school. We are still asking that parents not enter the school grounds, except for essential reasons - please call (or text if no-one is in the office) and we will advise you of the best method of helping.

Last week we received some exciting news regarding the COVID guidelines for the end of Term 4. Although we will not be able to hold our annual Sunset Picnic this year, we will be holding a combined End of Year and Year 6 Farewell assembly and be able to invite parents. This will be a little bit different from previous years, with specific seats for household members that are spaced at 1.5m from other families and there will be limitations to the number of guests that children can invite.

Our End of Year assembly will be held on Thursday 10th December at 1.30pm. Further details about who will be able to attend will be sent out in the coming weeks.

We will also be participating in two Kids in the Kitchen cooks before the end of the year. One will be held on Tuesday 1st of December and the other on Friday 11th December. Some students have money from Term 1, that can be used for these. A note with money owing or in credit, will be sent out this week. The cost of the cooks will remain at \$4.50 per cook and will need to be paid in advance.



Our students and staff were disappointed that we were unable to hold our annual Small Schools' NAIDOC Day with Crossmaglen and Orama Public Schools, this year due to the COVID restrictions. However, this did not stop us from having a great NAIDOC Day yesterday as a school. Both classes participated in a variety of activities inside and outside the classroom, to celebrate and recognise Aboriginal culture. They looked at Aboriginal Dreamtime stories and created their

own. They completed maths activities based on traditional Aboriginal maths and spent the afternoon together playing traditional Aboriginal games.

Outdoor Classroom Day

October Bee Reports

Last week the Bee reports had not been finalised and are in this week's newsletter. Hive 1 – Heath, Oliver B, Oliver R, Skeet and Tyson

Last week, our group checked Hive 1, we noticed that there were a lot of differences from our last observations in September. There were differences in the activity, the amount of pollen and the weight of the hive. The changes were all good.

The bees were much more active than the last few times. This time we observed 32 bees going out and 37 bees going in over a one-minute period. We saw that there were big clumps of orange, white and yellow pollen on most of the bees returning home. The weight of the hive went up by over 500g in the month.

Hive 2 – Aria, Caiden, Emma, Isabella, Milo and Remy

Last week we surveyed and observed the native bee hives, we looked at Hive 2. Originally this hive was very inactive, but it slowly progressed to be more active on warmer days. Although Hive 2 started as the heaviest hive, when they were first installed, it's weight had actually been going down over winter. In September, the weight went up a little bit and in October the hive has put on about 150g.

There was not a lot of activity in or out of the hive, but the bees returning did have pollen. We hope with the warmer weather we will see more activity in the months to come.

Survey for Before and After School Care

We have been asked to share this information with our families. We want to offer families more flexibility with their work commitments and child care arrangements and to create more opportunities across the whole community. Having Out of School Hours Care available at local schools is a great way to achieve this.

As part of the NSW Government's \$120 million Before and After School Care (BASC) commitment, parents at all NSW schools were recently invited to complete a Have Your Say survey. The survey asked parents to tell us how they are using Out of School Hours Care, how much it costs them, whether they plan to keep using it, and what difficulties they experience in accessing it. The survey results have helped us to better understand the needs of families and what's important to them.

We are now asking all parents to complete a <u>quick follow-up survey</u> by **Friday 27 November 2020**. You can access the survey at
