Soundwaves

Last week our students started a new spelling program that we are using across the Year 1 to 6 classes. Each student has been placed in a spelling group to support their current spelling abilities. The program is a systematic synthetic phonics program based on the 43 sounds that make up the English language. This means we will be working step-by-step to build students' skills to link letters to speech sounds. This will build on the Foundations they have learnt in Jolly Phonics in Kindergarten and help them to segment (stretch-out) the sounds in words to help them spell. Each week the Year 1 to 6 students will have the same sound as a focus across the whole school.

Kids in the Kitchen

Tomorrow (Wednesday), we will be participating in our second KiK for the term. If you know your child may be a little fussy, it is always a good idea to pack a normal sandwich or wrap for lunch. Our experience is that when students prepare and cook a meal and also see their peers eating the meal, they are more willing to try new foods. Over the years we have had many children, including extremely fussy ones, surprise themselves when they try new foods and realise they actually like them.

Children will be encouraged to try the meal and if they do not want or like it, will be asked to take it home for their family to enjoy. It might be a good idea to pack an extra container for any leftovers.

Science in 3-6

This term the 3-6 class have been learning about microorganisms. It has been very interesting so far and it has the students thinking, predicting and then checking their predictions in simple experiments. Last Thursday they were exploring yeast and what it needs to survive and flourish. There were many interesting predictions and great observations made.



Clean Up Australia Day at Raleigh

The official day for School's Clean Up Australia Day is Friday the 5th March. As 3-6M will be at the Soccer Gala Day, we have decided to do our Clean Up Day on Thursday. The students in K-2 will clean up around our school and weather permitting the students in 3-6 will walk along the roadside towards the roundabout.
